The Comeback Continues

2022 in Review

The transition to full summer camp operations continued in 2022 after experiencing two years of pandemic-related obstacles.

At the beginning of the year, the annual Winter Retreats were once again cancelled, though they have returned at full capacity in 2023! In the absence of winter programming, the Programs team executed a number of virtual programs to serve our camper population in the form of classes and social hours during the first part of the year.

After having served zero summer campers in 2020 and just 125 campers in 2021, Mt. Hood Kiwanis Camp welcomed 287 campers to Summer Camp in 2022. The lingering effects of the pandemic kept MHKC from achieving the full capacity of 475 summer campers, which is the goal for 2023.

Family Camp was expanded to two 3-day, 2-night sessions and served 23 families in 2022. Families enjoyed the unique getaway and all of the usual camp activities like swimming, hiking, riding horses, arts & crafts, fishing, experiencing the zip line, and climbing the rock wall on the exciting Adventure Course.

The **site and facilities** folks at Camp stayed busy improving, repairing and maintaining the facility, and serving the growing numbers of returning campers and rental customers. See the list of completed projects in the "Camp Numbers" section later in this report.

Staffing remained a challenge for summer camp in 2022. After two years away, Portland State University students returned as counselors, joined by a growing number of Pacific University and Jesuit High School students! In that two-year gap, however, we lost the pipeline of experience that make up our Counselor Supervisors staff which is why we were unable to serve as many campers as hoped. It is expected that situation will be better in 2023 as MHKC staff executes an aggressive staff recruitment plan.

Financially, limiting the number of campers by nearly 200 people caused a big revenue miss in camper registration revenue.

Camp rentals revenue continued recovering from pandemic disruptions and is expected to make a full recovery in 2023.

Fortunately, funds released to the states from 2021's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) resulted in grants that filled the shortfall in camper and rental revenue. We are expecting more opportunities to apply for ARPA-funded grants in 2023.

And MHKC supporters were very generous as usual with donations. *THANK YOU!*

2022 saw the launch of a capital campaign that has as its goal the replacement of the 45-bunk Hemlock dormitory with a modern 90-bunk building. Success from this effort will result in a model facility supporting people with disabilities, affirming the dignity of our campers, and increasing the number of campers served—always our primary goal. We're grateful for the over \$1.6M that has been raised as of this date in gifts and pledges from MHKC supporters.

Whatever 2023 brings, we're ready for it! We're optimistic that camp will operate at full capacity in 2023. We appreciate your continued support and hope to see you at beautiful Mt. Hood Kiwanis Camp in 2023!

Adjusting and adapting...

In January 2022, MHKC was still affected by COVID-induced capacity limits, so our Winter Retreat was fully virtual. As limits eased and gatherings resumed, MHKC faced a new challenge: providing programming and returning to full capacity with the absence of staff. Despite the year's challenges, our Programs Team successfully served over double the number of summer campers from 2021, expanded Family Camp to two sessions, and provided a fully virtual Winter Retreat experience. We are thrilled to share that 485 campers were served through MHKC programs in 2022, and we look forward to returning to full capacity in-person programming as well as a new program: the Fall Adventure Camp - in 2023!

Winter Retreat

Winter Retreats are typically held during the holiday weekends in January and February each year. In 2022, COVID capacity restrictions once again limited our ability to offer the in-person experience for the first several months of the year. As a result, our Programs Team along with six participants went virtual and enjoyed a 2-day Winter Retreat. The group spent time playing MHKC Jeopardy, painting aprons, dancing, cooking, playing games, making clay animals, and singing songs with the Staff Infection Band! It was a success - providing much needed connection, friendship and fun for all who attended!

Virtual Programming

MHKC's Programs team continued offering online classes and social hours all year long. Cooking, dance, yoga, arts & crafts, and more were featured serving dozens of campers in their homes.

Summer Camp

The transition to full operations continued in 2022 after two years of pandemic-related obstacles. After having served zero summer campers in 2020, and 125 campers in 2021, MHKC welcomed 287 campers to our Summer Camp program in 2022. Though staffing remained a challenge, a growing number of Pacific University and Jesuit High School students enrolled as summer camp counselors. 2022 also marked the return of our legacy capstone program with 132 Portland State University students joining us as one-on-one counselors. In total, almost 300 student counselors, volunteers, and professional staff comprised the Summer Camp team.

Family Camp

MHKC's Family Camp program gives campers the chance to explore camp life in a safe and supportive environment with their parents, caregivers, and/or siblings present. Structured to mimic our Summer Camp program, Family Camp gives families the chance to enjoy the outdoors together. In 2022, MHKC offered two Family Camp sessions and we were thrilled to serve 23 families. Although the rain was a challenge, attendees enjoyed all the amenities that Camp had to offer: swimming, hiking, horseback riding, the adventure course, cookouts, campfires, skits, arts & crafts, and more. It was a wonderful opportunity for families to connect with other families, create memories, and build a network of support, all while having a blast on the mountain! Continuing the financial comeback from COVID-19

While 2022 Programs revenue (camp registration fees) more than doubled from 2021, it finished at only 60% of pre-pandemic levels. Similarly, facility rentals revenue more than doubled year-to-year, though achieved just 63% of pre-pandemic totals. It is expected that these two revenue areas will return to 2019 levels in 2023.


Government grants rooted in 2021's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) again were a significant part of 2022 income, though considerably lower than in 2021. There will be opportunities to apply for grants from this source of funds in 2023, though it will represent a smaller and smaller amount as time goes on.

Foundation grants and individual contributions were a highlight in 2022. Over \$1.1M was raised for MHKC's Legacy 90 Capital Campaign during the year, along with another \$600,000 in five-year pledges! And generous unrestricted contributions from individuals were significant and humbling. Thank you!





Capital Campaign

2022 saw the launch of MHKC's Legacy 90 Capital Campaign to replace the aging Hemlock dormitory with a new, modern building that will dramatically improve accessibility and double bunk capacity, increasing the number of campers served and creating a more attractive, and lucrative, rental facility.

A particularly noteworthy grant of \$1M was received from the JTMF Foundation in support of the capital campaign in 2022, adding



to pledges from other supporters who share the vision of a future in which everyone who wants to go to camp gets to go and stay in fully-accessible, safe, state-of-the-art facilities.
